Host a celebration of LIFE after church; perhaps include a cookout, ice cream sundaes, music, and games.

Bring in a guest speaker about today's topics: human trafficking, refugees, prison ministry, homelessness, care for shut-ins.

Set up a panel discussion on the dignity of human life across multiple areas of need. For example, ask a person who works with the homeless, another who serves shut-ins, and another who engages in prison ministry to discuss how they uphold life and confess that every life is valuable.

Create

- a food drive that ties in with a special occasion: a holiday, a church service, or the change of seasons..
- a Helping Hands fund or Caring Corner where food, hygiene items, coats, and clothing can be donated. Accept monetary donations as well!
- a "dresser drive". Paint or refinish an old dresser and fill it with new or gently used items. Donate those items to a needy family.
- · a rummage sale and donate proceeds to a family in need or local organization.


