A Bible Study: Frog and Snails and Puppy Dog Tales



Father's Day reminds us that males mean more than mere strength. No one has to settle for "boys will be boys." We can still rejoice in real masculinity because God Himself has designed male bodies and male psyches for our good. Why not expect that, in time and with guidance, boys will be men?

Of course, our Gracious Creator does not regard males as more important than females. And we ought to acknowledge that unhealthy biases and unholy abuses have permitted and even promoted misogyny to the great harm of both individuals and societies. But though men may not resemble the Almighty more than women, they also do not bear more similarity to animals.

The Lord deals with us as father and brother and bridegroom. Sociological research has demonstrated – even independent of what we know from the Scriptures – that what fathers and husbands offer is irreplaceable. Our Heavenly Father in His Incarnate Son wills us to need and benefit from the love and company of males. So we need not retreat from the distinctives of masculinity.

- 1. What stereotypes about males have you heard circulated? Which of these do you find completely ridiculous? Which ones do you consider somewhat realistic?
- 2. In your childhood household, what tasks or activities did only the boys do? Which ones gravitated toward the girls? How about in your current household? How did or do you show appreciation to the boys? The girls? How did the girls express irritation? The boys?
- 3. God delights to relate to His people as a Heavenly Father. Drawing on Luke 11:9-13, 1 John 5:18, Hebrews 12:7, and Psalm 103:13, what particular activities does this include? Which of these—or His other fatherly qualities—do you personally experience and appreciate most? How do earthly father figures carry this out similarly and differently?
- 4. Genesis 2:15 and 2 Thessalonians 3:10-12 identify that the distinctive vocation of a man includes labor. What do you think it means to work? What do Ephesians 4:28, 1 Thessalonians 4:11-12, and Ecclesiastes 3:24-25 suggest as some of the benefits? What others can you imagine?

5. Genesis 3:17-19 outlines that sinfulness brings about specific consquences for males. What have you found are some of the burdens and sufferings that boys must endure? Men? Husbands? Fathers?



- 6. Isaiah 54:5 and Ephesians 5:25-28 describe our Savior's care as like that of a husband for his wife. What about masculinity reflects and embodies the grace of God? What distortions or misuses of masculinity have undermined these good dimensions? What privileges and what responsibilities do these imply for men?
- 7. According to Psalm 78:2-8 and Job 1:4-5, one of the primary missions of a male is to ensure that successive generations know the name of the Lord and live in His love. How have you witnessed the men in your life effectively leading and teaching with regard to the faith? What masculine characteristics suit them especially well for this?
- 8. 1 Corinthians 11:3 and 7-9 charges husbands and fathers to serve as heads of household. What do you think this means in practice? How do 1 Corinthians 11:11-12 and Mathew 20:25-28 clarify that this is not about power or control?
- 9. In 1 Timothy 5:1 and Titus 2:6, not only husbands and fathers but also young men and unmarried ones contribute to the Body of Christ. In what ways do we sometimes either show preference for or neglect toward these individuals? How can we better recognize and encourage their participation?
- 10. Deuteronomy 22:5, Leviticus 18:22, and Mark 10:6 insist that male and female are not interchangeable. What similarities do you see—both from the Scriptures and from your own experience—between men and women? What differences? How might you consider celebrating the blessings of manhood?

Is Your Life Ministry CAREFUL?



"With many such parables he spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it. He did not speak to them without a parable, but privately to his own disciples he explained everything" (Mark 4:33).

It is amazing how Jesus knew how to deal with every situation with such ease and wisdom. That perfection is worthy of imitating, even though we will never be perfect. Jesus used parables when He spoke with people so they could easily relate and understand. He went into greater depth with His disciples, as they were in a place where they could absorb more than the other lay people. This is how your life ministry should also work in your church.

One of the most important reasons for keeping things simple is that we need to be **CAREFUL**. We don't want to overwhelm the people in our churches with the complexity that can come with life issues. They will become disinterested if we are too quick in our presentation of information or throw things at them with too many details. Work at understanding where your people are and how much they already know. Be methodical in your equipping process, especially when an issue is sensitive and sometimes controversial. Grow the message as people start to understand more clearly.

Today, people have been bombarded with politics, the media, and communications that have caused factions and even severed family relationships. The world has focused on humanist elements such as "you have the right" and "whatever makes you feel good." The morals of our society have moved in a direction that condones things that are contrary to God's Word. Abortion, physician-assisted suicide, cohabitation, gender transitioning—and the list goes on—have become normal and acceptable in our society. Deep down, people may know—and their conscience may tell them—these things are not Godpleasing, but when they practice them, they get an immediate sense that they have solved the problem of the moment, and they feel good about it. (Maybe!) Indeed, those choices may haunt them for decades or even for a lifetime until they receive God's forgiveness when they come to terms with their sin and their need for repentance and God's grace.

Because these lifestyles and behaviors have become acceptable, and everyone may know someone who has participated in these practices, including themselves, sharing information becomes a sensitive issue. The political arena has often made loyalty to parties and candidates superior to what is often right, and thus politics can defy God's Word. Because of this, we always need to be **CAREFUL** in our communication.

Walking slowly doesn't mean we never address life issues as we must. We simply need to do it in a manner that would be God-pleasing. It means we need to discern where people are and carefully pick our words. Never apologize for sharing God's Word. Never excuse holding or defending a godly position that clearly states how a life issue stands according to Scripture. Abortion is wrong, as is assisted suicide, and many other life issues happening in our world.

Jesus presented His message by fitting the stories to His hearer's experience and maturity. We need to do the same. Do not be afraid to speak the truth but do it in love. Be consistent in your message, and the truth will prevail. God's Word is the ultimate authority. When we refer to it rather than our own understanding, we will find ourselves in a safe place. Continue to pray for discernment and understanding, and God will give you the guidance you need to be **CAREFUL**.



"I Don't Understand Why God ..."

I think all of us, at one time or another—and likely many more than just one time—have said, "I don't understand why God ..." It's usually prompted by something like a natural disaster which sweeps away homes and leaves survivors traumatized. It might be something more personal: disappointment over a prayer not answered in the way you hoped, serious illness, loss of a job, the death of a loved one. We don't understand. It doesn't make sense to our way of thinking for a loving God to let this happen.

Satan would like us to conclude that because we don't understand, God must be in the wrong. He must not be all-powerful, wise, and loving. Otherwise, He would see things as we do and always do what we want Him to. "I don't understand!" is then an accusation directed toward God.

However, "I don't understand" can also be an expression of humble faith. We don't always understand God's reasons for His actions in the direction of the world or for us as individuals and families. But faith doesn't demand it or expect it. If we with our sinful reason could understand everything about God, what kind of God would He be? He would be no better than we are. St. Paul freely acknowledged that he couldn't grasp everything about God and His ways. But rather than make it an accusation, he turned it into praise: "Oh, the depth of the riches of the wisdom and knowledge of God! How unsearchable his judgments, and his paths beyond tracing out! Who has known the mind of the Lord? Or who has been his counselor? ... For from him and through him and to him are all things. To him be the glory forever!" (Romans 11:33-36).

The next time you find yourself saying, "I don't understand why God ...," praise Him. Thank Him for His ways and thoughts which are so much higher than ours. Praise Him for His love. It is beyond our rational understanding that the holy God would love the unlovable even to the point of punishing His only begotten Son to save us. Since He did that for us, how can we doubt His loving purposes even in those things which we can't understand? In all things He promises, "I know the plans I have for you,' declares the LORD, 'plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future" (Jeremiah 29:11).

Life Project: It's Movie Night!

This project is shared by the Life Team at Mt. Zion Lutheran Church, Denver, Colorado.

Grab some popcorn ... it's movie night! The Life Team at Mt. Zion Lutheran Church in Denver, Colorado, hosted a Movie Night in April 2023. Church members had seen the movie, *Lifemark*, at a conference and were so moved and impressed by its message, they decided to hold a public viewing event at their church. *Lifemark* is based on a true story about an adopted young man of eighteen who begins the search for his biological parents (lifemarkmovie.com). The Life Team hosted the viewing of the movie and provided pizza, drinks, and dessert. They offered free babysitting so more parents could attend. They widely publicized the event beforehand throughout their chapter churches and were blessed when 65 people attended, including four children.

If you are interested in holding a movie night or nights, here are some things to consider:



- 1. Speak to your pastor(s) *first*. They should be a part of the decision as to whether this is a project for a one-time event or a continuing event. They should also be involved in the decision to choose the movie presented.
- 2. Research several movies for ideas. Ask others in your church(es) what movies appealed to them and why. Confirm the list with your pastor(s).
- 3. Line up volunteers to do the publicity, snacks, babysitting, etc. several weeks in advance so everyone knows exactly what needs to be done and by what date.
- 4. Consider pairing the movie night with a program at a different time, such as a speaker or a Bible study, to investigate the topic further. Lutherans For Life has excellent resources about many life issues that could be used to increase knowledge about a topic after introducing it in the movie.
- 5. Trinity Lutheran Church, Blanco, Texas, has been having a Thursday night movie night for two years or more. Popcorn and fellowship are an integral part of the evening, and a wide variety of Christian-messaged movies have been shown—both stand-alone movies and series.

Regardless of the movie you choose, consider a movie night to be a chance for your church members to celebrate life together—to laugh, to eat, to cry, to discuss life issues, or just to enjoy being together. The Body of Christ needs to hang out together to really get to know one another. A movie night is a great chance to do that! Lights ... camera ... action ...




The Belonging Frontline Playbook Is LIVE

All the resources for the *Belonging Frontline Playbook* are on our website ready to use. If you need quick access and don't have the link in front of you, the entire Playbook series, as we develop it, will be on the Frontline tab of our website. We have distributed the printed booklet containing the *Belonging Frontline Playbook* project to our Frontline leaders. If you haven't received a copy and would like one, you can download it on the website in either a printable format or a single-page format. Here is some additional insight into how you might consider using the resources provided:

• **Belonging** – Each of the four topical selections shares content relative to Belonging. In life, having a sense of belonging is extremely important and valuable to everyone, as being part of God's family of believers is a gift God has provided to us. Using these resources can help you in your life ministry to equip the people your serve in both feeling a sense of belonging and sharing that important gift with others.



- Video Each of the four videos has been repurposed from existing popular presentations. They have been edited to fit a format that will work in a presentation setting with a presenter and the audience you invite to view. The audience can be small, like a life group meeting, or large, like a Bible class or special event. The videos can all played from YouTube by clicking the link. You can copy the link in YouTube and play directly from there when you show it.
- **Devotions** Each of the topical groups has a devotion you can use when opening your event or showing a video. They are an excellent way of starting with a short study of God's Word relative to the topics.
- Fact Sheets These are very helpful resources in sharing factual information about the life topic. Hand these out to people as they arrive or at some time during your event. They can be used as conversation starters if you have discussion time. They will be very helpful in creating awareness about the life topic and will give people good information to take home and refer to at some time in the future as they think about what they learned at your event.
- Activity Sheets We all know how important object lessons are in the learning process. Giving people hands-on projects can be very useful and uplifting as they feel engaged in learning and sharing. These activities can be done at your event, as an activity preparing for the event, or as a post-event means of review and engagement to help emphasize what they learned about the life topic.
- **Timing** When the Frontline Playbook concept was developed, it was done with the goal of providing flexibility and consistency in the resources provided. There are four topics. You could



do all four over a period of time, be it four weeks for a month, one a month, one every quarter, or whatever seems appropriate for the church you serve. You can also pick one and just use that, keeping the rest for a future opportunity. If you only use one, that in itself is a great possibility.



- In-Person or Online Depending on how tech savvy your congregation is, you surely could promote a life topic for the month or whatever interval you choose and provide the video link with downloadable resources. Work with your church technology experts on the possibilities. Download the PDFs from our website and make them available on your church website. There are many possibilities. Of course, doing in-person events is also a plus, as it adds the element of fellowship and discussion. We leave this to your creativity as we hopefully have given you many options.
- What Are the Topics? Here is a brief overview of the four topics we selected in the *Belonging Frontline Playbook*. They don't need to be used in this order. Select and rearrange them in the order you choose that works best for your environment. We pray these bring inspiration as they each deal with important issues that touch people's lives every day. We hope they will bring hope and comfort and above all a sense of belonging.

Blessed as a Gift – Rev. Michael Salemink, LFL's Executive Director, shares the Gospel motivation that makes the Lutheran voice on the sanctity of life so distinct. He touches on creation and identity, surprise pregnancy, developmental and intellectual disabilities, and the unborn. He shares our Christian response from God's Word as we are fearfully and wonderfully made, created by God, showing that life is precious.


God Chose You to Belong – Michelle Bauman, LFL's Director of Y4Life, shares insights on on marriage and family and divorce, cohabitation, contraception, infertility and barrenness, and adoption and foster care. She shares our Christian response not to conform to the world but do good to everyone, celebrate the gift of life, and treat others the way you want to be treated as Christ has treated us.

People with Disabilities Are Indispensable – Mona Fuerstenau, Disability Advocate, and Rev. Scott Licht, LFL's COO/CFO, share how those with disabilities are indeed indispensable. They point out that disability issues are unique, as they are not all identical, and experiences are as different as the individuals who experience them. Our Christian response focuses on loving our neighbor through inclusion and building friendships, respecting each person by addressing them directly, and recognizing we live in a broken world, and that through sin, we are all affected, not just those with diagnosed or visible disabilities.

Blessed in Longing – Rev. Steven and Stephanie Cholak, pastor and teacher at Our Savior Lutheran Church and School, Houston, Texas, share their experiences of being barren through 18 years of marriage and continuing to be blessed by God in marriage and service. They share their Christian response in waiting for the Lord, crying aloud for the Lord who hears and comforts, and trusting the Lord will lead the lost and doubting according to the truth of His Word.

We have a God of mercy and comfort that has provided the message and means for us to live in a broken world. The hope we receive from Scripture needs to be shared. 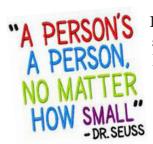

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Owen's Mission



I had held the 20-week *Touch of Life* fetal model in my hands hundreds of times in front of students from preschoolers to seminarians. Holding Owen revived in me the reality behind those models. I will never hold them in the same way again."





As Owen's grandpa, Dr. Lamb wanted to do something special to remember Owen, honor Jesus, and help others understand the value God gives to even the smallest of lives. The Basics of Lutherans For Life

Our Mission: Equipping Lutherans and their neighbors to be Gospel-motivated voices For Life **Our Vision:** Every Lutheran congregation upholding the God-given value of human life and influencing society to do the same

Structure and Relationships

A local Life Chapter is a local organization that has been chartered by National Lutherans For Life. The Life Chapter is formally associated with and subject to, but not a part of, the corporation known as Lutherans For Life, Inc.

A Life Team is a group of dedicated church members forming a For Life group within one congregation to serve under the auspices of the local congregation.

A Life Advocate is an individual working to support the church's pastor in keeping the flow of educational information in front of the congregation on a regular basis. *Life Teams and Life Advocates do not qualify for the remittance program*.

A State Federation is an organization that has been chartered by Lutherans For Life, Inc., in a state where there are at least five chartered Life Chapters. In a state where a State Federation exists, the Life Chapters also become affiliated with the State Federation. This occurs automatically at the same time a Life Chapter becomes chartered by Lutherans For Life, Inc. These relationships are basically the same whether or not the Life Chapter is incorporated. Thus, Lutherans For Life consists of a network of individual entities formally associated with each other.

Membership Information

All officers of State Federations and Life Chapters and Life Advocates must be members in good standing of Lutheran congregations and members of National Lutherans For Life. Membership contributions are divided among the national organization, State Federation, and local Life Chapter if it is chartered.

Life Chapters that wish to include a membership form in newsletters or correspondence are asked to maintain the form and information provided by the national office. The local Life Chapter may not establish its own membership program since LFL has a "unified membership" program. When sending a membership form to the national office, make sure the Life Chapter name and number, if chartered, is written on the form in the space provided. This will ensure that the State Federation and local Life Chapter receive the proper remittance payment.

Membership Classifications

Annual Membership

 Annual members join by making a membership donation accompanied by a completed copy of the membership form (or by joining online).

Sponsor Membership

- Sponsor members pledge to contribute a certain amount each month and to pray regularly for Lutherans For Life.
- Sponsor members receive a monthly letter from the executive director.
- Sponsor members are asked to renew their monthly pledge each year as part of the annual membership drive.

The Remittance Program of LFL

All MEMBERSHIP donations are shared with the chartered State Federation and/or local Life Chapter to which the particular members may belong. The membership donations are divided as follows:

Annual Memberships:

- 20% goes to the local Life Chapter (If there is no local Life Chapter, this 20% goes to the State Federation.)
- 20% goes to the State Federation
- 60% remains at national

Sponsor Memberships:

- 1/12 goes to the local Life Chapter (If there is no local Life Chapter, this 1/12 goes to the State Federation.)
- 1/12 goes to the State Federation
- 10/12 remains at national


